Seven Tips for Circle K Officers

For a successful year, the biggest thing to remember, while having fun and an enjoyable once in a lifetime experience, is to have a good line of communication between all executive officers and members. If there is no communication, there is no way to correct mistakes or get assistance when needed. A good open line of communication will make your year very successful and enjoyable, whereas the lack of it will make your time as an executive officer harder than necessary. The following are other things to keep in mind when working towards having a great and productive CKI year:

1) Plan early

One of the biggest problems that can lead to an unsuccessful year is not planning early enough. Take time at the beginning of the year to develop an event-planning guide as well as a calendar of events, deadlines, and other important dates. Be sure to include enough time just in case a particular event on your calendar requires approval from campus officials etc, or if a project or event may require the club to conduct fundraisers in order to come to fruition. This will save you some major headaches and will prevent the need to rush right before the event.

2) Ask for help

Everyone has experienced a period during the semester when he/she is overwhelmed. This is understandable. If it gets to the point, where you feel inundated by school related assignments, personal matters, and other extracurricular obligations, ASK FOR HELP! Do not neglect your duties as an officer or try to overload yourself. This will cause undue stress, which will result in you being less productive and may even affect you academically. If you realize that his is about to happen, ask for help before it is too late. Talk to your colleagues – let them know ahead of time if you are unable to complete an assignment. The more you trust and rely on each other the better your time together running the club will be.

3) Learn to have fun

At the end of a term as a Circle K officer, most people will not remember the time spent planning or slaving over a particular program. What he/she will remember are the good times spent bonding with each other and having fun. Have fun at board meetings, club meetings, and Circle K events, and you will appreciate it a lot more later on. If you enjoy your duties while performing them, time will go by a lot



faster and you will have gained that much more from your experiences in the club and as an officer. Learn to smile, laugh, and take each day for what it's worth. In the end, it will help decrease a lot of stress.



Show your appreciation

When someone does something exceptionally well or goes beyond the call of duty to help in a situation, show your appreciation. A simple thank you, a card, or a small gift as a token of appreciation goes a long way in making people feel special and welcomed. Circle K members do all that they do out of the kindness of their hearts. They are not being paid to do so; therefore, it

makes a big difference when someone shows that they are appreciative. It motivates people to want to do more and shows them that people do recognize all that they are doing for the club.

5) Be open and honest

Undoubtedly, situations will arise over the course of the next year where board members will have differing opinions on certain matters. When this occurs, be open with your board about it. Do not hide your feelings if you do not like a particular thing or a particular service project. Be vocal about what is going on and express your feelings in a calm manner. By communicating this to your fellow board members, it could really help your club. Have an open mind and be willing to come to a compromise. This can also increase morale on the board and make it more like a family.




Hang out outside of CKI events
